SECONDARY SCHOOL NEWS

We've gotten the year off to a great start! All the signs are pointing to this year being a good year as we transition from the impact COVID has had on our school over the past three academic years. I would like to say COVID is over, but it continues to hang on, with minimal impact on teaching and learning. Hopefully this trend will continue. Should a student become COVID positive we ask that you notify the school. We will still provide an Academic Coach and remote access to their classes for students who are positive during their period of isolation at home.

It's hard to believe that we've already been in school 4 weeks. Friday, October 7 ends our five week interim marking period. You can expect progress reports to be available through the parent portal by Thursday, October 13.

In general, based upon the last three years of dealing with COVID, COVID has not been easy nor kind to our students. Simply put, COVID has negatively impacted all students' learning. We need to recognize that three years of dealing with COVID has resulted in all of us (teachers, administration, staff and students) having Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome to some extent. Keeping that in mind, we have strategically made some changes to restore an academic focus and priority on learning. As we emerge and recover from the shadow of COVID, our four main priorities for our students this year are, 1) Maintaining High Expectations for teaching

and learning, 2) To increase students' participation in extracurricular athletics, clubs and activities, 3) To improve student attendance, and 4) to continue to provide high levels of support (academic, emotional and mental health) to our students. As we work to reestablish students' executive functioning skills, we are placing a high priority on completion of class assignments and turning their assignments in by their due date rather than allowing them to have until the end of the marking period. This is a simple, yet necessary, change which will yield great dividends and ultimately reduce student stress and anxiety especially at the end of each marking period. We want to partner with you as parents to support and maximize our students learning. Please do not hesitate to contact your child's teachers or guidance counselor if you have any questions or concerns.

On a positive note, our fall athletic teams are experiencing a higher level of success then they have had over the past years. Our FFA Chapter was recognized as the top Chapter (number 1) in New York State and with a 3-star national rating (highest rating possible). Great credit goes to Mrs. Burke, Mrs. Wightman, both of whom have been recognized on a state and national level, and our students. As all of our programs return to "full status" we are anticipating great results. We have great students, great teachers and a great community- how can we expect anything less than being great! Thank you for all of your continued support of our students and school. GO BEARS.



All programs end the week of December 5th.



Dear Parent, Guardian and School Staff,

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic pre-k, elementary, intermediate and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Tri-Valley Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation; faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications.

The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application
- Anti-microbial products
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready to use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees wasps and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.
